Student Led Volunteering

The SVP Sandwich/Soup Run Project

Together, we can make a difference

The **SVP** (St Vincent de Paul Society) is part of an international Christian voluntary network dedicated to tackling poverty in all its forms by providing practical assistance to people in need. Founded in Britain in 1844, we foster diverse and inclusive connections, as a Society that is welcoming of people of all faiths and none. We joyfully extend our hand in the care and personal service of individuals and families who need support.

Our 10,000 members, motivated by faith, visit vulnerable or isolated people across England and Wales and offer them friendship and practical support. The essence of our work is person-to-person contact and spending time with people is our greatest gift.

Time commitment: One hour to two hours per week

The Newman House SVP Soup Run is an in-house volunteering project set up to serve the homeless along Tottenham Court Road. If you are passionate about helping the homeless then this project is for you.

There are two arms to the Newman House SVP Sandwich/Soup Run project. The first team of volunteers make the sandwiches ready for the second team to handout on the streets. Because there is a Rota system you can volunteer for both arms if you wish, i.e., one week you could make the sandwiches and the next week you could be on the team that distribute the food and drink to the homeless. As a quick summary of the project, every (day of the week to be confirmed) we go down Tottenham Court Road handing out Coffee, Tea, and Sandwiches to rough sleepers.

Time commitment: around 1-2 hours per week. A separate group of volunteers makes the sandwiches earlier in the day. This usually takes about 1 hour.

This project run and organised by students who attend the Newman House Catholic Chaplaincy, and it is open to students from all universities. This is a great opportunity to volunteer alongside students from different colleges. There is a training day in the first term followed by a reflection/evaluation meeting in the second term.



The Food bank project

(Location: The Blessed Sacrament Catholic Church)



Role: Newman House Foodbank Coordinator

Job description: The Newman House foodbank coordinator would arrange the collection of food donations from Newman House. This would involve raising awareness of the collection to those attending Newman House and liaising with the foodbank to appeal for what they need most. It would also involve delivering the Newman House collection to the foodbank when required.

Times: This role is flexible but would require for example promoting the collection at the Newman House Mass and delivering to the foodbank at

suitable times to be arranged with the foodbank.

In March started a foodbank to respond to the growing issue of food poverty in the local area. Although it has only been running for 6 month the foodbank is already in high demand, receiving 75-100 guests each week. With the economic crisis the expectancy is that the number of clients visiting the foodbank will increase dramatically over the winter months.

The foodbank runs between 1-4pm every Thursday and is open to all. **Volunteers are needed** to help with the setting up and running of the foodbank each week and with food collection and supporting the foodbank to keep going.

Volunteer roles:

Role: Foodbank Volunteer

Job description: support with the running of the foodbank which may include set up, inventory, hospitality, managing the registration or the food shop during opening hours.

Times: Volunteers set up from 11am and the foodbank is cleared up between 4:30 and 5pm. You do not need to attend the whole of the session, however at least a couple of hours commitment during these times is needed.

Commitment: The whole term. However, volunteers could come every other week if they cannot do every Thursday.

Role: Foodbank Promoter

Job description: In order to continue running, the foodbank needs to increase donations of food, money and time. We therefore need help with promotion to find more volunteers and ask for more donations, this could involve creating posters/leaflets and social media to reach out to more people. We also want to create more links with local businesses who can support us financially or with donations of food they do not need. The foodbank promoter would therefore help us to find and approach these local businesses and create new relationships with them to support the foodbank. **Times:** This role is flexible and could be done in your spare time.

Commitment: the whole term.

READING PROGRAMME

The Reading Programme involves working with an 11- or 12-year-old student for two terms. You will be assigned to a tutee who needs help with their literacy skills and your duty will be to read aloud with them. Explore different learning techniques with your tutee to find a suitable one – each student learns differently. The student will usually bring a book of their choice, otherwise, books are available at the school's library.

Commitment: You will commit to one hour of tutoring each week. Sessions can take place at any time during school hours from Monday to Friday, because students will be pulled out of class for this programme. We will match the student's timetable with your schedule.

Saving Lives by Helping Pregnant Women



#Gap Year volunteering opportunities in the Philippines, India, Rwanda, Lithuania or Newcastle

GAP YEAR: Would you like to experience a new culture for a year and serve young people in poor communities as a volunteer? The Assumption Volunteer Programme offers opportunities to share one year of your life in a culture very different from your own in the **Philippines, India, Rwanda, & Lithuania.**

UK (Newcastle) we also receive each year an international group of young adults to volunteer in creative arts programme for children with social and educational problems in Newcastle. If you would like to join them then see contact details below. Applications from UK residents are welcome too!

We offer financial and personal support for 10 placements each year connected with the Sisters of the Assumption around the world.

Holy See – Internship - New York

Internship Cycles and Numbers: There are three internship cycles each year, autumn, Spring and Summer. It is possible for an intern to remain for more than one, doing two cycles or even a full year, but with the number of applications the Mission has been receiving, and the desire to give capable applicants the chance, it is becoming rarer that applicants will be accepted to more than one session, at least initially. The Fall Session extends from the beginning of September through just before Christmas; the Spring Session begins on Monday of the second week of January and extends



the end of May; the Summer Session runs from the Tuesday immediately following Memorial Day [the last Monday of May] through the end of August. An orientation and training program is given at the beginning of each cycle. Up to eight interns are taken for any given session.

Application Process: Application deadlines are April 15 for the following Fall Session, October 1 for the following Spring Session and January 1 for the upcoming Summer Session. The Application process involves sending a cover letter, a curriculum vitae, and two letters of recommendations (one from a teacher or academic advisor, the second from a Catholic pastor or chaplain) to arrive by the respective deadline at Internship Program, Permanent Observer Mission of the Holy See to the United Nations, 25 E. 39th Street, New York, NY 10016. A PDF copy of the mailed application should also be emailed by the deadline to office@holyseemission.org with "Internship Application" listed in the subject line. Applicants are encouraged to get in their applications well before the deadline. After applications have been received and evaluated, certain applicants may be invited to submit an essay on one of the themes in debate at the UN as the second stage of the process. After that, interviews may be scheduled via Zoom or, for those in the New York area, in person as the third stage.

Selection Criteria: Because of the nature of the work of the Holy See at the United Nations, interns must be practicing Catholics; understand, appreciate and believe in Catholic Social Teaching and in the values the Church seeks to convey before the international community; have graduated from university or be enrolled in a graduate program (undergraduates enrolled in programs may apply for the internship program, but preference will be given to graduates); be fluent in English and, if possible, in one or more of the six official UN languages; be a good, clear and precise writer, capable of analytic and synthetic thought and sound research in libraries and via the internet; and have the ability to work collaboratively as a member of a team. The maximal age to be eligible for the internship is 35 (at the beginning of the internship).

Hours: Interns normally work Monday through Friday 9 am to 6 pm. There are occasional night time events, as well as, once or twice a year, the need to assist in covering sessions when the UN is meeting on weekends. Attendance at the daily staff meeting after Midmorning Prayer each day at 9 am in the Mission Chapel is obligatory. Every first Friday of the month, and on Holy Days of Obligation, a Mass is celebrated at the Chapel in the Mission that all staff and interns are expected to attend.

Howeverity in the form of direct subsidies — which some may view as "handouts" — is not part of the Order's non operating methods. Handouts humiliate the people obliged to accept them and have an adverse effect by encouraging the beneficiaries to live on charity.

On **October 27**th, we are heading a short 15min walk to the West End Donor Centre, after 10.30 mass and lunch (please eat lunch if you are donating!) If you can book an appointment and join us that Sunday, please do so:)

This run is especially important as NHS stocks are running critically low (especially for O negative blood). For more information on restrictions and the process, visit **blood.co.uk** or ask on our WhatsApp group.

The NHS allows men to donate blood every 12 weeks and women to donate every 16 weeks, and we will continue to run sessions throughout the year together.

As a community, we can support each other and help save lives- the West End donor centre provides a fun and relaxing atmosphere, and a donation predated by Sunday mass is very special.

(Please note that you must first sign up as a blood donor with the NHS to donate on my.blood.co.uk, and then book an appointment- slots fill up around 1-2weeks before the session, and we book at or after 14.00 on the day)- and you can also donate plasma!




